Whew...and Thanks!

Thanks to Berkeley voters who enthusiastically supported Measure X in the November election, approving a small parcel tax increase to continue sufficient financial support for the Library. The original parcel tax of 1980 (44 years ago!) was no longer providing enough funds in our very pricey world.

78.55 percent of Berkeley voters voted Yes on Measure X; That's 41,788 library-loving voters!

Two factors ensured X's passage—the Berkeley Public Library is deeply beloved in this community...



and a cadre of about 20 volunteers did everything short of parachuting from the Campanile to spread the word about X. Members of the Friends of the Library and the Library Foundation walked precincts, wrote letters, greeted folks at the Solano Stroll, delivered lawn and window signs to hundreds of supporters (see photo above), and generally talked up the measure wherever they went.

No More Summer Slide 2024

Editor's Note: We've mentioned the "No More Summer Slide" grant before, and our support and delight in the project continues. Giving away books to kids that need them— it's a heartwarming no-brainer. Here's an update on the latest news.

No More Summer Slide serves Berkeley Unified School District K-5th grade students who have

difficulty accessing books during the summer break. The program is focused on providing new books to students and alleviating summer learning loss for this population. Students get to "shop" for books at a school fair and take them home.

Joal Arvinigian, BUSD's Reading Recovery Teacher Leader, coordinates the program and reported to the Friends that the program served over 740 students in 2024. Test results show that the grant is most effective with 2nd grade students and older. Regardless of age, owning books, and having access to books at home, is an important predictor of success in school.

Erica Glenn, BPL's Children's Services
Senior Librarian, agrees, 'This has truly
become a joint effort by the schools, the
Friends, and the Library, all with the
shared goal of helping children succeed
and to love reading and learning. Berkeley's children's
librarians work tirelessly to support the schools,
including springtime visits to classrooms and, of

course, the beloved Summer Reading Program (directly funded by the Friends). We are *all* enthusiastically in favor of getting books into children's hands, and by working together we can ensure that happens."

The Friends have been supporting No Summer Slide since 2017. We do not normally fund separate programs that aren't directly associated with BPL, as



our mission is specifically in support of the Library, but No More Summer Slide, and this unique alliance, working together, is the exception.

We don't know you, but we're grateful for your generous donation that came to the Friends via the National Philanthropic Trust. We've scoured our membership list, queried our Board, and even called the grants team that issued the check, but we could not elicit any information about you. If you're reading this, please accept our sincere thanks.

Occasionally we receive a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) from a brokerage or financial institution where we recognize the donor and can write a proper thank you letter. A QCD allows individuals who are 70½ years old or older to donate up to \$105,000 total to one or more charities directly from a taxable IRA instead of taking their required minimum distributions. As a result, donors may avoid being pushed into higher income tax brackets. Consult your financial advisor (obviously). If you are in this fortunate situation, the Friends will put your money to good use!

We have kept our annual dues to a minimum for many years to encourage broad membership and continued renewals, and we are particularly appreciative when members send a little extra our way.


SAD NEWS

Friends Don't Let Friends Miss Good Books



Friends president **Cathy Brown** suggests *The Adversary*, a novel by Michael Crummey (2024).



"It takes two to tango: a brother and sister in coastal Newfoundland (circa early 1800s) compete, conspire, and ultimately destroy each other and other poor souls of the hardscrabble frontier mercantile fishing and shipping community. Yes, there are moments of human kindness, but more often there are pan-

demic, lies, drunkenness, and brutality. There are also more Anglo-Saxonisms for male and female parts than imaginable. No wonder the author credits Francis Grose's A Dictionary of the Vulgar Tongue." Friends Board member **Vivian Pisano** recently enjoyed *Enter Ghost* by Isabella Hammad (2023).



"The author has written a thoroughly captivating story of two Palestinian sisters: Sonia, an actress living in London and Haneen, who lives in Haifa, Israel. Haneen's friend Mariam persuades Sonia to take a part in her production of *Hamlet*; and thus begins Sonia's political awakening. The tensions and hardships in the West Bank

from the Palestinian perspective provide a personal view and an understanding of a long-standing situation which is so relevant today. Hammad's brilliant and powerful prose pulled me into this moving novel."

Staff Scholarships

The Friends of the Library began offering scholarships for Library staff in the late 1990s, to an effort provide financial help for those wishing to pursue a degree or certificate that would further their careers in public library work. The Scholarship was founded in memory of Gina Minudri, who was Director of the BPL and later of the SFPL.

Over 50 employees have received funds and gone on to library careers in Berkeley or other areas. At least 4 of them are currently working in the Berkeley Public Library!

Until 2021, the scholarships were primarily for the master's in library and information sciences (MLIS) at San José State University.

In 2021, the FOL Scholarship Committee, in consultation with the Library Director, expanded the criteria for scholarship support, to include studies towards broader educational advancement, e.g., to improve language skills, marketing or design work, computer or social media, etc., and studies towards an AA, B,A, MLIS, etc. The Scholarship award is up to \$3,000, depending on tuition cost and expenses.

In 2024, seven applicants were awarded funding for the MLIS and one for a Certificate in Translation.

Whether it's full-scaled Downsizing, or just a few items...

If you're thinking about donating books or media to the Friends but are a bit hesitant to do so because... well... would the Friends really want them? Here are a few guidelines; by following them, you'll have helped the Friends and the Library, and have cleared some space in your home. Win-Win-Win!

First of all, and you probably know this already...

We sell *gently-used* donated books and media to provide funds to support community programs at the Berkeley Public Library. We are a non-profit organization, and we are all volunteers. We run two used bookstores that re-sell your donations of books and media.

And we are so grateful for people who donate books and media

to us. But sadly, we just cannot accept everything. We're not a thrift store or a recycling site.

Here's what really matters:

Condition, condition. And that's something you can determine. As you select books to donate, you may be thinking "I'm sure someone will like this." Well, no, someone won't...not if it's dated, damaged, heavily underlined, musty smelling, or yellowed. And if you can't read the spine, nobody else can either. Please recycle these items on your own. Your curbside blue bins are a good place to start.

So for books, what does "dated" mean?

It's older books on a topic that changes rapidly: law books, medical or health books, textbooks, travel

guides, business books, computer manuals, stock market guides, etc. Really, does anyone want a book on

> divorce law that's 18 years old? Or even 8 years? You don't, and no one else does either. Back to those blue bins!

Donor: "15 years isn't really so old for a travel book."

Be safe! Please don't hurt your back (or ours) lugging in large sets of Time/Life books. Or any multiple volume set. It seems as if everyone bought them and

What's "dated" mean for media? Mel Tormé?

For media, "dated "refers to the equipment, not the individual playable item. CDS, DVDs, and audiobooks are all ok, but we no longer accept VHS tapes or cassettes. There just isn't a market
